



My beloved brothers and sisters in Christ!

As I sit down to write this article, I realize surprisingly that I have already completed three months of serving as your priest in the wonderful community of St. Thomas. These months have been very full of God's blessings and the prayers of our Saint. I thought it would be fitting to share with you my first impressions.

In one sentence, I would describe the parish of St. Thomas as a model parish. Since its founding in 1967, the parish has faced many challenges and met each one with faith, unity, and exemplary stewardship. At the same time, it continues to bear witness to the vibrant Orthodox Christian faith in the modern world.

Thanks to the generosity and great sacrifices of those who envisioned this parish, a beautiful church was built to the glory of God. Over the years, the church has been beautified and renovated. The iconography and beautification projects allow the faithful to rejoice in the church's beauty, and visitors admire it with awe. Because of their hard work and sacrifices, they have given their children, grandchildren, and future generations a precious spiritual gift, this community, which they must preserve, strengthen, and pass on.

This is why our stewardship goal for 2026 is to reach one thousand members. Not for financial reasons, but so more people can share in the honor and responsibility of serving the church with joy and love. This goal is spiritual above all else. It speaks to the very nature, purpose, and life of the parish.

I often remember with deep emotion a parishioner from another community I served. Even though she struggled financially, she never missed sending a ten-dollar check each month. And this blessed woman reminded us of the Gospel story of the widow who offered only two small coins, yet Christ praised her publicly because she gave from her heart, all she had. In the same way, each of us is invited to participate according to the willingness and generosity of our heart, trusting that God rewards every offering with His abundant blessing.

We see this blessing not only individually or within our families, but also as a community. How great a joy and blessing it is to observe the children of the Greek School, the Sunday School, GOYA, the altar boys, the dance group, and all our young ones who worship and receive Holy Communion every Sunday. A wonderful and well-organized ministry is being done with our youth, and it is our greatest hope and the most valuable investment for the future.

We were especially moved by the presence and participation of our youth during the historic moment when our community welcomed the sacred relics, the icon, and the holy epitrachelion of Saint Iakovos of Evia. The children rejoiced, and we are certain that these moments were engraved in their memory with bright, unforgettable colors. It was so beautiful to see our altar boys being tonsured and receiving the Laying on of Hands and the silver cross from our spiritual father, His Eminence Metropolitan Apostolos of New Jersey!

My brothers and sisters, please keep our youth as your first priority, in your love, your prayers, and your support.

And now we walk together toward the Holy Feast of Christmas. The hymns of our Church already draw us into this sacred atmosphere, and each Sunday, we await them with longing: "Christ is born! Glorify Him! Christ is come from heaven! Go and meet Him!" or "On this day the Virgin Maid!"

We journey as humble pilgrims to Bethlehem, to the cave of the Nativity, and may God grant us the blessing to kneel before the eternal God who becomes a little child for our salvation.

I invite all of you to celebrate these holy days together, with participation in the divine services and the sacred worship of our Church. Let us unite our prayers with our brothers and sisters throughout the world. Let us unite our voices with the angelic hymn, "Glory to God on the highest and on earth peace," and let us pray with all our strength for peace in our troubled world, peace that is a gift from above, the fruit of the Holy Spirit, the only peace that can bring healing to whole world.

Αγαπητοί μου αδελφοί εν Χριστώ!

Γράφοντας το άρθρο αυτό συνειδητοποιώ - μάλλον με έκπληξη - ότι συμπλήρωσα ήδη με τη Χάρι του Θεού τρεις μήνες διακονώντας ως ο ιερέας σας την ευλογημένη κοινότητα του Αγίου Θωμά. Ήταν τρεις μήνες πυκνοί, πλημμυρισμένοι με την ευλογία του Θεού και του Αγίου μας, και σκέφτηκα να μοιραστώ μαζί σας τις πρώτες μου εντυπώσεις. Θα μπορούσα να περιγράψω την εμπειρία μου με συντομία και πολύ απλά λόγια δηλώνοντας ότι η ενορία του Αγίου Θωμά αποτελεί ένα πρότυπο ενορίας, καθώς έχει καταφέρει να αντιμετωπίσει με επιτυχία και υποδειγματικό τρόπο πολλαπλές προκλήσεις από την ίδρυσή της το 1967 έως σήμερα. Αλλά επίσης έχει καταφέρει να παρουσιάζει μία ολοζώντανη μαρτυρία της Ορθόδοξης χριστιανικής πίστης στο σύγχρονο κόσμο.

Χάρη στη γενναιοδωρία και τις μεγάλες θυσίες των ανθρώπων που οραματίστηκαν την ίδρυση αυτής της ενορίας έχει οικοδομηθεί ένας θαυμάσιος ναός προς δόξαν Θεού. Και ο ναός αυτός στη συνέχεια ευπρεπίστηκε, ανακαινίστηκε, διακοσμήθηκε, ενώ οι εργασίες εξωραϊσμού συνεχίζονται με τη θαυμάσια εικονογράφηση και άλλες παρεμβάσεις, με αποτέλεσμα οι πιστοί της ενορίας να χαίρονται την αισθητική του και οι επισκέπτες εκτός ενορίας να θαυμάζουν την ομορφιά του. Με τον τρόπο και το αποτέλεσμα αυτό ο κόπος και οι θυσίες των ανθρώπων που προσέφεραν δικαιώνονται και αποτελούν ένα πολύτιμο πνευματικό δώρο στα παιδιά, τα εγγόνια και τις επόμενες γενιές, που θα παραλάβουν την κοινότητα με ευθύνη να την διατηρήσουν, να την ενισχύσουν και να την παραδώσουν με τη σειρά τους στους επόμενους.

Αυτός είναι ο λόγος, που ορίστηκε ως στόχος της Εθελοντικής Προσφοράς για το 2026 η ενορία μας να φτάσει τα χίλια μέλη. Για να μοιραστούμε όλοι μαζί και όσο περισσότεροι μπορούμε με αγάπη και χαρά την τιμή και την ευθύνη της διακονίας. Ο στόχος αυτός δεν είναι οικονομικός. Είναι πρώτα από όλα πνευματικός και αφορά την ουσία και τον τρόπο ύπαρξης και ζωής της κοινότητας. Θυμάμαι με μεγάλη συγκίνηση μία ενορίτισσα σε προηγούμενη κοινότητα, που διακόνησα, η οποία παρά τη μεγάλη οικονομική δυσκολία που αντιμετώπιζε, δεν παρέλειψε ποτέ την αποστολή μιας επιταγής κάθε μήνα ύψους δέκα δολαρίων. Και μας υπενθύμιζε αυτή η ευλογημένη γυναίκα την ιστορία του ευαγγελίου με τη χήρα γυναίκα, που προσέφερε μονάχα ένα δίλεπτο, αλλά ο Χριστός την επαίνεσε δημόσια για τη διάθεση της καρδιάς της λέγοντας ότι αυτή η χήρα γυναίκα έδωσε όλα όσα είχε. Ανάλογα με τη διάθεση και την προαίρεση της καρδιάς του

λοιπόν ο καθένας ας αναλάβει την τιμή να συμμετέχει στο έργο της ενορίας και να είμαστε βέβαιοι ότι ο καλός Θεός ανταμείβει με πολλαπλάσια ευλογία κάθε προσφορά.

Την ευλογία αυτή τη βιώνουμε όχι μόνο σε προσωπικό ή οικογενειακό επίπεδο αλλά και ως κοινότητα. Πόσο μεγάλη ευλογία είναι για παράδειγμα να καμαρώνουμε τα παιδιά του Ελληνικού Σχολείου, του Κατηχητικού Σχολείου, της GOYA, τα παιδιά στο ιερό, τα παιδιά του χορευτικού συγκροτήματος και όλα τα παιδιά που εκκλησιάζονται και κοινωνούν κάθε Κυριακή. Στη νεολαία μας γίνεται ένα έργο σπουδαίο, πολύ καλά συντονισμένο και οργανωμένο και το έργο αυτό είναι η ελπίδα μας και η καλύτερη επένδυση για το μέλλον. Χαρήκαμε ιδιαίτερα την παρουσία και τη συμμετοχή των παιδιών, που είχαν πρωταγωνιστικό ρόλο, στην ιστορική στιγμή για την κοινότητά μας, όταν υποδεχτήκαμε τα ιερά προσκυνήματα, την εικόνα και το ιερό επιτραχήλιο του Αγίου Ιακώβου εν Ευβοία. Χάρηκαν και τα παιδιά. Και είμαστε βέβαιοι ότι οι στιγμές αυτές χαράχθηκαν στη μνήμη τους με χρυσά και ανεξίτηλα χρώματα και θα αποτελούν πάντα μία όμορφη και συγκινητική ανάμνηση. Πόσο όμορφο ήταν όταν είδαμε τα παιδιά του ιερού να λαμβάνουν τη χειροθεσία και το όμορφο ενθύμιο τον ασημένιο σταυρό από τα χέρια του πνευματικού μας πατέρα, Σεβασμιωτάτου Μητροπολίτη Νέας Ιερσέης, κυρίου Αποστόλου! Σας παρακαλώ, αδελφοί μου, να παραμείνει η νεολαία μας ως πρώτη προτεραιότητα στην αγάπη, την προσευχή και την υποστήριξή μας.

Και να, που οδεύουμε πλέον προς τα Άγια Χριστούγεννα. Οι ύμνοι της εκκλησίας μας εισάγουν ήδη σε αυτό το κλίμα και ανυπομονούμε κάθε Κυριακή να ακούσουμε τους ύμνους αυτούς. «Χριστός γεννάται, δοξάσατε»! «Η παρθένος σήμερον»! Πορευόμαστε όλοι μαζί ως μέλη της Αγίας Εκκλησίας, ταπεινοί προσκυνητές προς τη Βηθλεέμ, προς το σπήλαιο της Γεννήσεως, και είθε να αξιωθούμε να γονατίσουμε ενώπιον του προ αιώνων Θεού, που σαρκώνεται ως «παιδίον νέον».

Σας προσκαλώ με αγάπη να συνεορτάσουμε αυτές τις άγιες μέρες με συμμετοχή στη λατρεία και τις ιερές ακολουθίες. Να ενώσουμε τις προσευχές μας με τους αδελφούς μας από όλη την οικουμένη. Να ενώσουμε τις φωνές μας με τις αγγελικές ψαλμωδίες «και επί γης ειρήνη» και να προσευχηθούμε με όλη μας τη δύναμη για την ειρήνη στον κόσμο. Ειρήνη, η οποία είναι δώρο του Θεού, καρπός του Αγίου Πνεύματος, άνωθεν ειρήνη και μόνο έτσι μπορεί να γίνει ειρήνη του σύμπαντος κόσμου.

LETTER FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL PRESIDENT THE SUCCESSES OF 2025 AND THE RESPONSIBILITIES OF 2026

Dear Fellow Parishioners,

This year was very busy for Saint Thomas. We continued with our iconography and beautification of our Church with exceptional woodwork. We started the Apostolic Times publication. We organized the most successful Agora in the history of our community. We made major improvements in our buildings by replacing the roofs of the entire complex. Our Hellenic School excelled. Our Youth Ministries flourished, receiving prizes in many Metropolis competitions. Our Philoptohos is one of the most active organizations in our area in helping the less fortunate.

Then, a few weeks ago we were given by His Eminence Metropolitan Apostolos of New Jersey the distinct blessing to host the Feast Day of St. Iakovos Tsalikis of Evia, the patron Saint of our Metropolis. Anastasios Efstratiades Parish Council President The weekend of November 21 and 22, were filled with blessings and joy as the Saint Thomas Greek Orthodox Church received the blessing and honor of His Eminence Metropolitan Apostolos of New Jersey bringing the icon and epitrochelion to Saint Thomas for veneration. Saint Iakovos of Evia is the patron saint of the Metropolis of New Jersey and His Eminence often goes to the monastery of Saint David in Evia to venerate Saint Iakovos' relics and for prayer and solitude. Saint Iakovos has played an important part of HisEminence's life and the abbot at Saint David the the icon and vestment to His Eminence. This was to be the first time the icon and epitrochelion would be brought to a church in the Metropolis of New Jersey.

Because this was a special occasion and it was anticipated that faithful throughout the Metropolis would come to Saint Thomas to venerate the icon and epitrochelion, it was necessary to prepare for the historic visit. Father Georgios Oikonomou, Proistamenos at Saint Thomas and Anastasios Efstratiades, Parish Council President, recognized the significance of what was about to happen and that in order to provide a lasting, memorable, and inspirational experience for the Orthodox faithful throughout the Metropolis of New Jersey and the Philadelphia area, all organizations at Saint Thomas had to be involved. Father



and the President met with the heads of the organizations individually which included the Parish Council, the Saint Irene Philoptochos Society, the Hellenic Afternoon School, GOYA, and the Hellenic Heritage Dance Group. Continuing to prepare for the Saint Iakovos weekend, Zoom meetings were held twice per week. Father prepared a plan for the youth to be involved which included greeting His Eminence upon arrival with the icon. Clergy throughout the Metropolis were invited to attend as well as dignitaries and honored guests throughout the Metropolis.

A dinner was planned for Friday following the vespers service catered by Adelphia Restaurant. A more formal coffee hour was scheduled for Saturday following the Divine Liturgy hosted by the Saint Irene Philoptochos Society.

Every detail for the weekend was planned in detail. His Eminence informed Father and the President that he wanted to tonsure our acolytes and bless the acolytes from other parishes.

The church and gymnasium were prepared as well as the Saint Irene Hall to allow clergy to vest. A committee of law enforcement officers or those with law enforcement experience was formed to ensure proper security for the icon and relic. No detail was too small to escape planning and all contingencies were anticipated.

His Eminence Metropolitan Apostolos of New Jersey arrived with relic and icon at 6:00 pm Friday November 21. Greeting him outside the church were approximately 25 priests and two deacons throughout the Metropolis and other Orthodox jurisdictions as His Eminence escorted the icon of Saint Iakovos into the









church. Thereafter the vespers service began with parishioners throughout the Metropolis, dignitaries and honored guests attending. At the end of the service His Eminence blessed the acolytes giving them a cross.

On Saturday November 22 His Eminence concelebrated with 25 priests and deacons the Divine Liturgy. At the end of the Liturgy His Eminence tonsure the Saint Thomas acolytes.

The icon and epitrochelion of Saint Iakovos remained at Saint Thomas through Sunday November 30. Father Georgios held a Paraklisis for Saint Iakovos during Thanksgiving week and then on Wednesday brought the icon and epitrochelion into the altar.

This was a memorable and very successful weekend for all who attended and for all who helped prepare for the event. May Saint Iakovos continuously intercede on our behalf and pray for the continued health and welfare of His Eminence Metropolitan Apostolos and our beloved Metropolis.



FEAST OF ST. IAKOVOS OF EVIA, PATRON SAINT OF METROPOLIS OF NJ, CELEBRATED IN CHERRY HILL

CHERRY HILL, NJ - His Eminence Metropolitan Apostolos of New Jersey on November 21 celebrated the Great Vespers for the Feast of St. Iakovos of Evia, the patron Saint of the Metropolis of New Jersey, at St. Thomas Greek Orthodox Church in Cherry Hill. Upon his arrival with the epitrachelion vestment relic of St. Iakovos of Evia, His Eminence was welcomed by the community's presiding priest Fr. Georgios Oikonomou and 30 brother clergy of the Metropolis of New Jersey alongside Parish Council members, Archons of the Ecumenical Patriarchate, the Metropolis Philoptochos, altar boys from the Delaware Valley Region and over 200 faithful. A litany celebrating the arrival of the icon and relic of the saint was held before the entrance into the church and the Great Vespers.

The icon, commissioned by the Metropolis, was

prepared by renowned iconographer Georgios Giariskanis from Thessaloniki, Greece.

In his Vesperal homily, His Eminence foremost shared that the life of St. Iakovos and that of all the new saints of the Church prove that the Holy Spirit is active in the world to this day and that our Church is a living one. This reality, Metropolitan Apostolos said, was apparent in his acquisition of the relic of the saint during his visit to the Monastery of the Venerable David in Evia, Greece. After celebrating the Divine Liturgy and sitting in the monastery's reception room, he made a request of Abbot Gabriel for one of the Saint's belongings to bring back to the Metropolis of New Jersey to encourage the faithful who now proclaimed him their patron saint. Responding to this request, Abbott Gabriel respectfully declined, explaining that the monastery only had one final article of the Saint's vestments left that had not been taken or given away. The Abbott explained

to His Eminence that he would, however, think and pray about it as he left briefly to go pray with a family who had come to ask for St. Iakovos' intercession. Returning from the chapel to the reception room, Abbott Gabriel (whose eyes His Eminence stated were somber and teary) bore in his hands the final remaining epitrachelion of St. Iakovos. He proceeded to hand the vestment to His Eminence and explained to him "this belongs to you."

"As a Metropolis, we are indebted to the Monastery of St. David and Abbott Gabriel who through the prayers and will of St. Iakovos bestowed on us such a blessing and pillar of hope of our Patron Saint who stands and intercedes for us before the throne of God."

Before the dismissal, His Eminence gathered the nearly 45 altar boys who had come to serve during the festal vespers service and bestowed on them a special cross to be worn during their service in the altar. He prayed over them entreating the Lord that they may follow the model of St. Simon of Cyrene,



who assisted Christ on his excruciating climb up Golgotha by carrying His Live-Giving Cross. His Eminence thanked the altar boys for being present, encouraging them to continue to grow in their service to the Lord. His Eminence also thanked the parents and grandparents of the boys for their efforts in raising their children in the Church and to continue to encourage them to keep their children in the calm harbor that the Church provides.

Following the dismissal of the Great Vespers, His Eminence dearly thanked, Fr. Oikonomou, the Parish Council, the community of St. Thomas and all the benefactors for making the evening possible. He thanked Archon Isidoros and Mrs. Maria Garifalakis from Portland, Oregon, whose generosity was instrumental in the construction of the reliquary and the painting of the beautiful icon of the saint. He also specifically recognized the Grand Benefactors of the evening, Dr. Spiro Spireas and Dr. Amalia Spireas (represented by their son Sotiris Spireas) and Mr. George and Mrs. Zoe Kousoulis (who made a contribution in memory of their daughter Danielle

Kousoulis). Through their generosity, the parish was able to offer a wonderful meal and reception for all the pilgrims who came to venerate the relic and icon of their new patron saint and protector.

Upon the conclusion of the Vespers, Fr. Oikonomou, Parish Council President Archon Anastasios Efstratiades and the entire Parish Council presented an engolpion with St. Iakovos' icon to Metropolitan Apostolos, honoring his historic efforts.

During the reception, the community thanked the many sponsors, volunteers, ministries, and pilgrims from the communities of the Metropolis. His Eminence also thanked the iconographer Giariskanis and the woodworker, Ilias Laskou, who prepared the gold-plated case for the icon and the relic. Both Giariskanis and Laskou flew in for the weekend from Thessaloniki for the feast of St. Iakovos. Giariskanis is also the Iconographer for the new iconography work at St. Thomas that he is in the process of completing.

The Hierarchical Divine Liturgy was held on November 22 and led to more pilgrims venerating the relic and icon. The Liturgy was presided over by His Eminence Metropolitan Apostolos with the participation of a large number of Metropolis clergy. After the Liturgy, the community held a luncheon for all in the Danielle Kousoulis Center. At the luncheon, His Eminence announced that the St. Thomas Church will have the relics for veneration from November 23 through Wednesday November 26.



2026 Brings "For The Ages" Iconography to Conclusion, Transforming our Church Proper

At Saint Thomas Greek Orthodox Church, we are nearing the culmination of a remarkable journey—the completion of our "For The Ages" Iconography program. DISCOVER THE MEANING OF OUR CHURCH ICONS

I warmly welcome all of you to this new series of lessons that we are beginning at our Church of Saint Thomas, to explain the significance of the holy icons painted on the walls of our church.

First and foremost, I would like to explain why we venerate these holy icons and adorn our churches with them, especially since throughout the ages there have been periods when the importance of holy icons was disputed. One question is from what time we actually begin to venerate and honor holy icons. So, we will tell a story that took place in very ancient times, in the era of Christ Himself. It is about the very first icon of Christ, which was not made by human hands but was miraculously given to us.

In Edessa of Syria, there was a king named Abgar whose wife had fallen gravely ill. He tried everything to cure her, called the best doctors and wise men of that time, and promised them anything they needed if they could heal her. But no one could.

King Abgar heard about Jesus and that He could heal the sick. So, he wrote a letter and sent messengers to find Jesus and deliver it. The letter asked Jesus to come and heal his wife and even invited Jesus to come and live in his land if His own people mistreated Him.

When the messengers reached Jerusalem, it was the time when Jesus had already been betrayed by Judas, arrested, and was on the way to His crucifixion. As He was on the road to Golgotha, the messengers met Him. Jesus asked for a cloth to wipe His face, and His image was miraculously imprinted on it. He told them to give this image to their king. When King Abgar's wife was blessed with it, she was healed.

This icon is called the Holy Mandylion, the first icon of Christ. Since Christ Himself allowed His image to appear this way, it is a strong reason why we venerate holy icons.




Icon of Abgar holding the mandylion, the image of Christ (encaustic, 10th century, Saint Catherine's Monastery, Mount



St. Luke the Evangelist

It is also worth mentioning that Saint Luke the Evangelist, author of the third Gospel and the Acts of the Apostles, was one of the earliest iconographers. According to sacred tradition, he painted several icons of the Theotokos. It is said that the Virgin Mary herself saw these icons and blessed them, saying, "May the grace of him who was born of me be with these icons." This historical testimony adds depth to our understanding of iconography.

It is not just art; it is a holy tradition with apostolic roots filled with divine grace and spiritual presence. Also, just a few Sundays ago, we celebrated the Holy Fathers of the Seventh Ecumenical Council in Nicaea in 787 AD, which affirmed that honoring and venerating icons is not idolatry. We do not worship the materials of the icon but honor the person depicted. And so, the veneration of icons is established in the tradition of our Holy Church.

We have two main types of icons: portable icons and frescoes. In our lessons, we will explain the beautiful frescoes in Saint Thomas Church.

Now, let us move on to the main part of our presentation after this general introduction about the veneration and significance of holy icons in the history and tradition of the Orthodox Church. The first icon

we will analyze is the icon of Christ the Pantocrator, which is always found in the dome of every church. When we lift our eyes upward, we see the beautiful image of Christ the Pantocrator painted in the dome.

The word Pantocrator means "the One who holds all," the One who rules over everything. It is no coincidence that He is depicted in the dome, which symbolizes the heavens, yet is also connected to the earth. The dome is not suspended in isolation; it rests upon and is united with the earthly structure. This shows that Christ is the One who reigns over all, sees all, blesses all, yet is not cut off from us. The very architecture of the church represents this unity of heaven and earth, the mortal and the immortal, the temporary and the eternal. When we enter the church, in a mystical and sacramental way, we enter the eternity of our all-good God. Christ is, of course, the second person of the Holy Trinity, the only begotten Son and Word of God, who existed before all ages and came down for our salvation. He taught us, worked miracles, and gave us His holy teachings in the Gospels. We are grateful to Him because He protects and blesses us.

So, Christ the Pantocrator is depicted in the dome, and we must lift our eyes upward to see Him. Sometimes people ask, "Where is God? Why do I not see Him?" But to see God, certain conditions must be met. As Christ Himself said, "Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God." We must pray and lift the eyes of our heart to the heavens to behold our Lord Jesus Christ the Pantocrator. We must always remember that God is the One who holds all authority, and this divine authority is not to be confused with human authority. We do not look to earthly rulers for our ultimate salvation, for true salvation comes only from God.

Surrounding the image of Christ the Pantocrator in our church, we can also read the powerful words from Psalm 80: "O Lord, O Lord, look down from heaven and behold, and visit this vineyard, and perfect that which Your right hand has planted." This prayerful verse reminds us that the Church, the vineyard of



the Lord, belongs to God alone. It is planted by His right hand, sustained by His grace, and constantly in need of His loving visitation. When we look up at Christ in the dome, we not only see our Creator and Savior, but we also echo this heartfelt plea: "Lord, come, visit us, protect us, and help Your Church flourish." These words around the Pantocrator are not decorative, they are a living prayer offered by all of us, the faithful, to our heavenly King.


As we gaze upon the face of Christ the Pantocrator in the dome, we notice something striking: His eyes. They are not harsh, but neither are they simply soft. One eye often appears to express mercy, while the other reflects justice. This dual expression is intentional. It reminds us that Christ is both the merciful Savior and the righteous Judge. His gaze searches

our hearts, not to condemn us, but to awaken us. He invites us to live a life of repentance and spiritual awareness. His eyes are not distant, but deeply present — looking into the soul of each one of us, calling us to return to Him with sincerity.

It is also meaningful that the Pantocrator is placed in the highest, most luminous part of the church — the dome. The dome itself symbolizes the heavens and eternity. It is round, without corners or end, reminding us of the everlasting kingdom of God. Light often enters through windows around the base of the dome, illuminating the face of Christ from above. This light is not just architectural — it is symbolic of the divine light that enlightens the souls of the faithful. Just as physical light flows from the dome

into the entire church, the presence of Christ should radiate into our hearts, our homes, and our lives. The icon of the Pantocrator, high above us, reminds us that our lives must be oriented upward — toward heaven, toward truth, toward the face of Christ.

We can also see surrounding the Pantocrator the holy angels depicted. This symbolizes the phrase in the Divine Liturgy, "the One who sits upon the Cherubim." The throne of God is supported by the

holy angels, who are, according to Holy Scripture, ministering spirits sent to serve. These angels are God's creations with special roles, whether in worshiping God or revealing His will. For example, the Archangel Gabriel was sent to announce to the Virgin Mary that she would become the Mother of God. Angels also have a personal role in each believer's life. From the day of our holy baptism, we are each given a guardian angel who accompanies us, blesses us, and protects us throughout our lives until we return our souls to the Lord.

Now, let us talk about the Gospel that Christ the Pantocrator holds. The Gospel is the law and the guide for our lives as Christians. The very word "Ευαγγέλιο - Evangelion" in Greek means "good news." It's not just about rules or restrictions, but about leading us freely closer to God and experiencing a taste of paradise. The Gospel is there to guide us into freedom and a deeper relationship with God, and we must understand its significance and make it a part of our lives.

Therefore, my beloved brothers and sisters in Christ, let us not allow this holy image to remain just a part of the decoration of our church. Let it become part of our daily lives. Every time we enter the church and lift our eyes to Christ the Pantocrator, let us also lift our hearts. Let us ask Him to watch over us, to correct us, to strengthen us, and to bless us. Let His gaze be our compass. Let His Gospel be our guide. And let His kingdom be our goal. For the one who looks upon Christ with faith, humility, and love will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life. May the image of the Pantocrator reign not only from the dome, but from within our very souls.

Finally, as we look at the prophets depicted around the dome, we see how they connect the Old and New Testaments, showing that Christ is the fulfillment of the prophecies. This will be the theme of our next presentation, where we will delve deeper into the role of the prophets and what they teach us. Let us always remember that Christ the Pantocrator is the One who holds all, and the angels and prophets around Him remind us of His eternal kingdom and His love for us all.

JOURNEY TO NICAEA

On November 26 through December 1, 2025, the Greek Orthodox Church and the Catholic Church celebrated together the 1700 Year Anniversary of the Nicene Creed. Saint Thomas Greek Orthodox Church was represented by Archon George G. Horiates and his wife, Lisa Horiates. The visit to Turkey and Nicaea commemorated the first Ecumenical Council which set forth the Creed which is at the crux of our Christian beliefs.

The week-long series of events centered also on the feast of Saint Andrew the First-called Apostle, brother of the Apostle Peter and patron of the Ecumenical Patriarchate. His All-Holiness Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew welcomed His Holiness Leo XIV to our sacred center of Orthodoxy. The joint recital of the Creed we use today unadulterated in the Orthodox church, reaffirmed the desire to continue the walk with firm determination on the path of dialogue, in love and truth. As successors of the two Holy Apostles, the founders of the Church, the witnesses keenly felt the ties of spiritual brotherhood which obligate us to work diligently to proclaim the message of salvation to the world.

Divinely inspired by the action of the Holy Spirit, the First Ecumenical Council of Nicaea strengthened ecclesiastical unity. This was precisely the meaning









of the visit and participation of the Catholic Church and Pope Leo XIV to the Venerable Patriarchal Church of Saint George where he was welcomed by His All-Holiness Patriarch Bartholomew during the Divine Liturgy on the Feast of Saint Andrew.

The Imperial City and the World witnessed a historic 1700 Year Journey to Nicaea. A joint declaration consistent with today's world was issued by Patriarch Bartholomew and Pope Leo. "The goal of Christian unity includes the objective of contributing in a fundamental and life-giving manner to peace among all peoples. Together we fervently raise our voices in invoking God's gift of peace upon our world. Tragically, in many regions of our world, conflict and violence continue to destroy the lives of so many. We appeal to those who have civil and political responsibilities to do everything possible to ensure that the tragedy of war ceases immediately, and we ask all people of good will to support our entreaty."

Archon George and Lisa Horiates were joined by numerous global religious leaders, representatives of governments, non-government organizations and pilgrims world wide. Saint Thomas Greek Orthodox Church was honored to have been represented at this landmark moment, reaffirming our support of the Ecumenical Patriarchate and in witnessing people of all nations, ethnicity, backgrounds and languages together in peace and unity.



INTERNET ORTHODOXY OR ECCLESIAL ORTHODOXY?

Two young visitors walked into St. Thomas Church in Cherry Hill early on Sunday, November 30, when our Church commemorates the Feast of Holy Apostle Andrew the First-Called. They came with open hearts, seeking a deeper connection to the Orthodox Christian faith. They were not the first. Since the beginning of the year, fifteen visitors like them have crossed the threshold of our parish, each longing for a more authentic connection with Christianity. Each one confessed that their journey began online.

They had spent time exploring the internet, trying to trace the roots of the Christian church and hoping to find in Orthodoxy what their hearts had not found elsewhere. This growing phenomenon is undoubtedly a blessing, yet it is also a challenge and potentially a danger.

This trend has been discussed in many recent articles, and it has been thoroughly explored in the book "What I Was Looking to Find" by Peli Galiti Kyrvasili, published in Greece by "En Plo".

In this reflection, however, I wish to turn our attention to a specific aspect of the issue: the role of the internet as a strange, impersonal "missionary" that suddenly undertakes apostolic work without accountability, oversight, guidance, or pastoral responsibility.

A striking example of this unregulated environment is the countless social media groups titled "Ask About the Orthodox Faith," where anyone—well-intentioned or not—publicly offers opinions and answers theological questions. These groups generate confusion, inconsistency, and a general atmosphere of spiritual chaos.

This problem does not only concern non-Orthodox seekers; it primarily concerns many of our own Orthodox faithful. Many baptized Christians were never systematically catechized, studied the sources of their faith, or learned the inner life of the Church. Now, they search for answers on questionable websites or, more recently, through artificial intelligence.

They then appear on the screens of strangers as self-appointed defenders of the faith—confessors, apologists, and "guardians of tradition"—yet they advocate a version of Orthodoxy that they have neither lived nor studied nor truly loved. They present a faith that is strict, condemning, and ultimately opposed to the Gospel and the Holy Fathers.

Is the internet, then, something evil? Certainly not. It can be a powerful tool for the spread of the Gospel. However, this can only happen if it is rooted in the life of the Church, guided by proper ecclesiology, and framed by clear pastoral boundaries. Ideally, access to theological material online would be mediated through one's parish—a closed, accountable environment in which the priest knows his flock.

Without such boundaries, however, the digital world becomes a stage for constant violations—actions undertaken beyond one's pastoral boundaries—which are contrary to the Second Canon of the Second Ecumenical Council and many other Holy Canons.

Consider, for example, the not-uncommon situation in which someone challenges his confessor during the sacrament of Confession: "But a monk online says something different..." "This other priest on YouTube teaches otherwise."

However, confession is not a counseling session. It is a holy mystery. Priests who hear confessions do so with the blessing of the bishop and with pastoral discretion, humility, and love, asking for God's Grace. As St. Sophrony Sakharov teaches, the spir-

itual father offers a sacred "first word"—an inspired pastoral offering extinguished when replaced by the opinions of online guru-like figures.

Some of these online voices are truly luminous and spiritually uplifting. But others are foolish, fanatical, and spiritually dangerous. Some promote an imagined purity and generate anger toward priests, bishops, archbishops, and patriarchs. They consider themselves superior—more spiritual, more orthodox, and more righteous than their spiritual fathers. They see themselves as saviors of Orthodoxy.

Often, these attitudes border on pathology. Yet the commandment of God is clear: "Honor your father." Even if our spiritual father makes a mistake, what should our Christian response be? To insult him? To curse him? To declare him a heretic?

It is tragic and sorrowful to see so-called "Orthodox warriors" online attacking their own clergy with hateful insults and accusations of betrayal. The irony is profound. If their priests were truly heretics, they themselves would not have valid sacraments because they received baptism, confession, and holy communion from those same priests.

The harm caused by the internet in this respect is immeasurable. The answer is not to flee the digital world, but rather to ground ourselves firmly in the living tradition of the Church.

This means having a personal relationship with one's parish priest, reference to the bishop and archdiocese, joyful obedience to synodal decisions, humility, and not placing ourselves above everyone else.

It is astonishing how quickly people with little or no theological education—armed only with an "Internet Orthodoxy"—turn with hatred and fanaticism against their clergy. They label themselves apologists while standing at the very edge of schism. They dream of a church made up only of the "pure," ex-

pelling anyone who does not mirror their imagined spiritual perfection.

However, our authentic faith is rooted in mercy and love. In the Garden of Gethsemane, Christ prayed for the unity of his disciples, reflecting the communion of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. At every Divine Liturgy, we pray, "For the unity of all."

How, then, can we despise people of other Christian traditions? How will we receive them with love when they knock on the door of our churches, as those two young men did last Sunday? Should we drive them away as "heretics"? Did Christ reject the Canaanite woman because she was pagan? Did he reject the Samaritan woman because she belonged to a heretical sect?

Whenever we reject those outside the Church, we imitate Jonah, who cared nothing for the salvation of the Ninevites simply because they were not his fellow Israelites. Yet God taught Jonah, and through him, us all, that every human being is God's child and bears His image.

The growing interest in the Orthodox faith is a tremendous blessing and a great responsibility. We must not allow the anonymous internet to perform our missionary work for us because it will likely cause more harm than good. Instead, with the blessing and guidance of our bishops, we must consciously labor within our parishes to help sincere seekers encounter Christ and his saints through the holy mysteries and authentic ecclesial life.

Life in Christ transforms the human person, carrying him like a pilgrim aboard the spiritual ark of the Church toward salvation. However, Internet Orthodoxy often leads to spiritual shipwreck because it lacks the ecclesial foundation that can steady the soul in the midst of a storm.





Simeon Poulathas - Grade 12 Ambassador of FAITH (Worship)



METROPOLIS OF NEW JERSEY DIACONATE RETREAT

The First Annual Metropolis of New Jersey Diaconate Retreat under the direction of His Eminence Metropolitan Apostolos of New Jersey was held Saturday October 25, 2025 at the Saint Thomas Greek Orthodox Church. Father Emanuel Tsarnas, deacon at the Saint George Greek Orthodox Church in Ocean, New Jersey organized the Retreat with the direction of His Eminence Metropolitan Apostolos. The Retreat was held for those ordained as deacons in the Metropolis, those waiting for ordination, those who were students in the Holy Cross Greek Orthodox Theological Seminary Diaconate Certificate Program and those interested in attending the program.

Father Emanuel Tsarnas gave a brief history of the Diaconate Program at Holy Cross and also what being a deacon entails. He then introduced His Eminence to speak. His Eminence Metropolitan Apostolos of New Jersey spoke positively and praised the diaconate program saying that the diaconate was a vital part of the Orthodox Church. He instructed everyone to study the Liturgy prior to serving and to follow the Liturgicon. His Eminence thanked everyone for attending and was pleased with the turnout.

Following lunch special guest Father John Chryssavgis, Arch Deacon of the Ecumenical Throne spoke to the attendees concerning where the diaconate was headed to in

the Orthodox Church. Father John has been a deacon for 41 years which he said is usually a steppingstone to the priesthood. He said that most Orthodox are not used to a deacon in the services, however, the deacon is part of the tradition of the Church. The deacon's calling is service in the Church much the same as when the Apostles ordained and laid hands on the first deacons in Acts Chapter 6 when Stephen and five others were made the first deacons. Father John noted that Saint Athanasios was a deacon at the First Ecumenical Council in Nicaea. Today the deacon is the mediator between the ordained clergy and the laity as they move inside and outside the altar during services. The deacon today stands during the Liturgy "within earshot" of the Theotokos asking for her intercession and supplication. Moreover, deacons are vital in their service to the Church as they teach at Holy Cross Theological School, are the Youth Advisors, Chaplains and serve in the International Orthodox Christian Charities and Orthodox Christian Mission Center.

The Diaconate Retreat was a blessing for those attending and all are looking forward to the Diaconate Retreat next year.







"THE ST. THOMAS "KALI PAREA" ENJOYS ITS 19th YEAR!"





The "Good Company" is a free-wheeling gettogether of Greek-American men, mainly retirees, that meet once a week "cafe-style" to drink their coffee, and to share their pleasant company and discuss issues of interest. The language is Greek. Everyone is welcome, every Wednesday at 10am-12noon, especially new members, that are received with great pleasure! The "Kali Parea" (Καλή Παρέα) started 19 years ago in November, with three friends: Chris Vranas of Mt. Laurel, George Kousoulis of Haddonfield, and Chris Sivas of Cherry Hill, meeting for coffee at the Moorestown Mall.

They soon invited and attracted many more, and it was not long afterward that they moved their "kafeneio" to a small room in the basement of St. Thomas Greek Orthodox Church at Cherry Hill, NJ. This get-together became so popular that the original meeting room was not large enough, so it was moved to its present location, at the St. Irene Hall of the same basement. At this unique social gathering, there thrives a culture of sharing historical perspectives, humorous jokes, educational tidbits, fond memories of Greece, and the experiences of becoming Greek-Americans.

Over the intervening years, this unique group has thrived, with the current number being 44 members. Each weekly gathering often exceeds 30 people, especially through the Fall through

Spring, when many return from their annual visit to "The Homeland, Greece." Their roots come from throughout Greece, including the Ionian and Aegean islands, the mainland North and South, and the Peloponnese.

Most were born in Greece, and came to America as young men, seeking their fortune in the "New World," met the difficult challenges of young immigrants, and became successful businessmen or professionals, family men, and community leaders. They love their mother country, but also share a deep affection for their second "Patrida," the USA.

As is to be expected, as most members are of retirement age, over the passing years quite a number have been called to join their maker, and thus over 20 of the original group are fondly remembered. We are happy to have two of the founders, George and Chris, with us. Although the "Kali Parea" remains - on purpose - unofficial, so as to maintain its loose, free-wheeling "cafeneio style" existence, it has in

fact become a recognized and respected part of the Greek community. It is always a pleasure to be joined, at the Wednesday meetings, with St. Thomas' recently welcomed Priest, Fr. Georgios Oikonomou, who enjoys the company and contributes to the discussions.

Several of its members, with experience in restaurants, are part of the core of the volunteers that man the kitchen and/or serving at various community functions, including the annual "Agora" (Greek Food Festival,) the monthly Maturity Club's luncheons, and supporting and being members of other social organizations of the St. Thomas Church. The "Kali Parea" supports the Church itself, as well as to the various philanthropic societies such as the Philoptochos, and others. Together with the Maturity Club, the "Kali Parea" co-sponsored one of the Saints of the recently completed iconography project of St. Thomas Church at Cherry Hill.




